


The Pastor's Epistle


Bloom Where Planted

One morning, I noticed a tomato plant growing in the crack between the sidewalk and the building. I was surprised: how had a seed managed to take root in a patch of dirt in downtown Buffalo?

I was reminded of a saying from the 1600s by Saint Francis de Sales, Bishop of Geneva: "Bloom where you are planted." If the quote sounds familiar, it's because it was later made popular in the 20th century by the artist and illustrator Mary Engelbreit.


The meaning resonated with me. I realized that I can only "bloom where I am planted" as




Even though some days I feel frustrated because I'm not seeing the results of my work happen as quickly as I'd like, I remember that the outcome is not my responsibility.
